Subject:	Report CPFS16-024 Participatory Budgeting Pilot Vote Results

Purpose

A report to recommend the successful 2016 Participatory Budgeting Pilot projects be approved for implementation.

Recommendation

That Council approve the recommendation outlined in report CPFS16-024, dated July 25, 2016, of the Director of Corporate Services as follows:

That the following ten 2016 Participatory Budgeting (PB) projects be approved for implementation, as outlined in the following table:

Budget and Financial Implications

Each of the five wards was allocated \$20,000 for Participatory Budgeting through the 2016 Capital Budget (Project # 3-4.03) for a total of \$100,000.

The Participatory Budgeting Administration Budget of \$7,500 was established from the 2016 General Contingency Budget as approved in Report CPFS15-002 dated January 25, 2016, to fund items such as room rental and meeting facilitation. Of this budget, \$4,782 was spent administering the pilot, leaving a balance of \$2,718.

The total cost of the combined recommended projects is \$98,577. However, the Ward 1 - Otonabee vote resulted in a tie for the first place project. The total for both was estimated to cost \$22,561 which is more than the \$20,000 allotment for that ward. It is recommended that the overage of \$2,561 be funded with unspent funds that were allocated to cover administrative costs, leaving a surplus balance in the administration budget of \$157.

Of this total \$98,577 cost of the projects, \$96,016 will be funded through the capital project, leaving a balance of \$3,984 which may be used as a contingency for unforeseen items.

Background

During the 2015 budget process, Council expressed support for an increased level of public engagement in the budget process. Council approved Report CPFS15-019 Participatory Budgeting, dated May 11, 2015, which established the framework of the PB pilot program for the 2016 calendar year. Report CPFS15-002 dated January 25, 2016 recommended the launch of the My Peterborough Participatory Budget 2016 Pilot, establishing guidelines including goals, timelines, rules, roles and responsibilities.

The My Peterborough PB process was kicked off on February 17, 2016 with a public education session. In the following months, Councillors held ward specific community brainstorming meetings which were followed up by some informal community meetings. Project ideas were generated resulting in 52 registered projects.

Each Project Leader worked with City staff to learn about City plans and policies that could affect the project. Once the project detail was determined, a project cost estimate was developed. This combined information helped determine the project's eligibility. Ultimately 21 projects were considered eligible to advance to the vote. The full list of registered projects, by ward, and their eligibility status can be found in Appendix A - My Peterborough Participatory Budgeting 2016 Pilot - Registered Projects and Eligibility Status.

Project Leaders could start their campaign for votes on May 26, 2016, in advance of the voting period which ran between June 3 and June 15, 2016.

The Vote

All residents, age 16 and up, could vote for one project in their ward. Residents had a choice of voting on-line or at City Hall. The PB 2016 pilot relied on the honour system, and did not require community members to provide identification.

A community vote was not required in two wards. All four eligible projects in Monaghan Ward (Ward 2) were acclaimed, as the combined projects totaled \$19,960, falling within the \$20,000 ward budget. Northcrest Ward (Ward 5) had one eligible project valued at \$18,820. It was also acclaimed.

The remaining three wards participated in a vote.

The vast majority of residents engaged in the vote through the on-line system with 1,231 entering the on-line voting process. Of these, 1,098 completed the voting process, with 889 casting a ballot in one of the three wards that had a contest and 209 identifying with either Monaghan or Northcrest Wards, which had acclaimed projects. The remaining 133 individuals did not complete a ballot for a variety of reasons: they disqualified themselves because they were not eligible to vote (ex: residency or age) or perhaps they chose to complete the voting process at a later time, or not at all.

In addition, 12 ballots were cast in person at City Hall.

Results

Of the 21 projects eligible for vote, it is recommended that 10 projects advance to implementation.

In addition to the acclaimed projects in Monaghan and Northcrest Wards, staff are recommending that the top two projects in Town Ward (Ward 3) move forward to implementation. The Protected Bike Lane Demonstration Project had 111 votes and the London Street Parkette Improvements Project had 110 votes. Combined, these projects total \$17,500. In Ward 4 – Ashburnham, only the top project, Pollinator Gardens - Nichols Oval and Rotary Trail, with 99 votes, valued at \$19,956 is recommended to proceed.

The Ward 1 - Otonabee vote resulted in a tie for the first place project; Crawford Trail Extension and Pollinator Gardens each received 63 votes. The total cost for both is \$22,561. In the absence of pre-determined mechanism to handle a tie-vote scenario, staff recommend that both projects proceed and that the overage of \$2,561 be funded with unspent funds that were allocated to cover administrative costs of the PB Project.

Should Council approved the PB process again at some point in the future, lessons learned from this pilot will be incorporated into a revised framework and rules will be established beforehand on how to handle unforeseen circumstances such as tie vote scenarios.

The eligible projects, a brief description and vote results, together with the acclaimed projects are included in Appendix B - My Peterborough Participatory Budgeting 2016 Pilot - Vote Results and Successful Projects.

PB Evaluation and Future PB Processes

Evaluation of the pilot PB project is in progress and is expected to be reported out to Council in September 2016. The evaluation will measure the effectiveness of the pilot against the stated goals of the PB program, identify process improvements, quantify the amount of staff time to offer the program, and identify the impacts to the Corporation.

Summary

Of the 52 projects registered in the My Peterborough Participatory Budgeting 2016 Pilot, 10 are recommended to move forward to the implementation phase. It is anticipated that these projects will be completed within 12 to 18 months.
