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**Remembrance Day Service at  
Camp X Intrepid Park**

Those of you who enjoyed the PHS June bus trip Camp X Revisited will be happy to hear that a Remembrance Day Ceremony was held to honour this intelligence community of World War II.

Remembering how we stood at the Camp X monument on a blustery cold day looking over the fields and Lake Ontario, we can appreciate the following excerpts from an article by National Security reporter, Michelle Shephard, in the *Toronto Star* of November 12:

“Wreaths were laid from...CSIS, Canada's Spy Service, and another from the Communications Security

Establishment, the country's electronic eavesdropping agency, and the North Shore Amateur Radio Club. Evelyn Davis carried the final wreath to remember Camp X, the unofficial name for the World War II paramilitary training camp and spy school which stood on the site. Evelyn, now 86, states ‘I was just a radio operator. I would not have known if what passed through my hands was important or not. But as secrecy is lifted we're learning more about the camp. What happened there was important.’ One hundred members of the spy service attended the ceremony at Intrepid Park honouring the overlooked participants in the war – the intelligence community.

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**Heritage Buildings and their stories**

At the November meeting, Andrew Elliott presented a look at Peterborough architecture through the workmanship of the notable architect, William Blackwell.

William Blackwell began his career in Peterborough, travelled to Toronto, New York and Winnipeg and returned to Peterborough at age 34. He worked on 435 Brock Street (Brock Street was known as Doctor's Alley). This building was torn down and replaced by the Peterborough Credit Union. He designed St Luke's Anglican church on Rogers Street. After a fire devastated the interior, this property was transformed by volunteers of the Peterborough Theatre Guild from a burnt-out shell into their current facility.

Early in his career Blackwell also worked in Guelph, Lindsay and Port Hope. Then came the

Lech House on the corner of Stewart and Rubidge Streets built of the more expensive yellow brick, in the Second Empire style with rounded dormers and balconies. Sadly this house is bereft of much of its architectural detail.

In 1886 to 1889 he designed Harstone House at 565 Water Street named for the family who owned it for many years before it became the Red Cross headquarters. It was built in the Queen Anne style for John McWilliams, an unappreciated mayor of the City, who moved away to Winnipeg, later becoming the Lt Governor of Manitoba. The house still maintains its original towers, balconies, notable chimneys and stained glass and a magnificent staircase of cherry wood. It was designated by the City both for both its exterior and interior qualities. Colonel Harstone was the sheriff of Peterborough for many years and died peacefully at the house in his 80s.

In 1886 Blackwell was commissioned in Ashburnham to build the bracketed Italianate house for the Sullivans, three storeys high with 12 foot ceilings and much painted and stained glass. After the Sullivans, it became the home for the Sisters of the Holy Blood before being altered into apartments. It is now privately owned and well maintained.

In 1887 Blackwell built 84 Benson Avenue for himself, a modern Tudor Revival with Arts and Crafts elements, well back from the street with double hung casement windows and a recessed entry.

In the 1890s Nicholls Hospital, a Romanesque and Gothic building was given to the City by Charlotte Nicholls, a generous community benefactor. The YMCA at George and Murray Streets of Richardson Romanesque style was built in 1895. In 1931 a sympathetic addition was added by Blackwell's son, Walter. In 1905 the Grand Opera House said to be the largest and finest in Canada, was built for Rupert Bradburn. Many theatrical performances took place at the Grand until the 1930s.

The impressive Armories building on Murray Street was built between 1907 and 1929 with William Blackwell as one of the supervising architects. He also supervised the provincial designs for Queen Mary and King George Public Schools in 1911-1912.

How fortunate we are still to have, and use so many of these buildings. Mr. Elliott's well re-


searched articles in the *Peterborough Examiner* are an important source of information about Peterborough's public and private buildings.



### **Ketchecum Hunting and Fishing Club**

The October PHS meeting featured the history of the Ketchecum Hunting and Fishing Club which was founded in the 1850s on the Ennismore shore of Chemong Lake, as depicted in early photographs of tented sites. George A. Gillespie, the club's executive director, told a fascinating story of the Club's beginning and its evolution. The Club traditionally met in the first week of November to hunt and fish. Membership was by invitation. Several prominent Peterborough area men were members; names such as Turner, Monkman and Eastwood. The permanent camp site purchased from the Crown on the west side of Catchacoma Lake in Cavendish Township encompasses a mile of shoreline. Each year a cook was hired for the week. Good food (as well as venison and fish) was a main attraction for the hunters. On arrival at the Hunting Club Friday evening New York sirloin steaks were served and at the end of the week a traditional Christmas dinner was shared. Each morning bacon and eggs and coffee fortified the men for the hunt. Some years the hunt was good, but every year there was good camaraderie.

In 2001 the old Club was sold and a modern club house built on land in the North Kawarthas. Wives join their husbands each New Year's for a feast worthy of hunters. The old ways were good, commented Mr. Gillespie, but now it's even better.

An excellent archival collection was displayed with written records, casual snap shots and professional photos by Fred Roy. Sketches of fish (drawn on the walls of the original hunting cabin) were preserved and on display.

Indeed the Ketchecum Hunting and Fishing Club is an important part of the Canadian way of life here in Peterborough County.
