
SIR SANDFORD FLEMING -**His Early Diaries**, 1845 - 1853 By Jean Murray Cole

The Peterborough Historical Society is pleased to present Jean Murray Cole, author, past president of the Society, and editor of the newly launched book Sir Sandford Fleming – His Early Diaries 1845 - 1853. The editing of Fleming's diaries has been a long wished-for project of the Publications Committee of the Peterborough Historical Society. It is a distinct accomplishment that Jean Cole, a member of the Committee, has completed this book which is published by Dundurn Books.

It is also fitting that Jean Cole launched this book at Hutchison House which is owned and operated by the Peterborough Historical Society. Fleming lived at Hutchison House with his cousin Dr. John Hutchison and his family, for two years on his arrival in Canada at age 18. He wrote these most interesting entries from age 18 to 26 as he was finding his way, and struggling to get established in his rewarding career as a railway builder and innovator, in his new home country.

Copies of Sir Sandford Fleming – His Early Diaries -1845 - 1853 will be available for purchase, and signing by the author, at the presentation..

Thank you very much to Erin Panepinto and the wonderful Museum volunteers for so ably keeping up with the pace. We really couldn't have done it without you!

Nicole Payne, a student of the Trent University Teacher Education program, has been on a placement with the Museum since September. Nicole has been assisting with ongoing programming as well as conducting independent research to develop new educational programs for the museum. Judging by her interaction with the children it is plain to see that she really enjoys working with the kids. I have no doubt she will make a fabulous teacher.

Another student joined the Hutch House ranks in the fall as well. Laura Stein is studying at Sir Sandford Fleming College. Laura's part-time position was made possible through a grant from Young Canada Works in Heritage. A Little Christmas Wreath History

Did you know that the decorative value of wreaths is believed to have been derived from ancient traditions? In the same way that we use house numbers today, wreaths featuring different floral arrangements were used to identify particular families and houses. In ancient times Romans used wreaths as a sign of victory. Victors of battles would hang wreaths upon their doors to advertise their status.

There is much symbolism attached to wreaths as well. The shape of a circle has no beginning and no end. This may represent the eternal nature of God's love, or the circle of life. Evergreens are used to represent immortality and victory of life through darkness and challenge. The fact that evergreens live through winter signifies the strength of life.

At Hutchison House, the sale of wreaths for Christmas has also become an annual tradition. As with other traditions, this one has a history worthy of telling. It all began in 1995 when Doreen Jones suggested we take orders for fresh greenery wreaths as a fundraiser for the Museum. That year she took orders for 24 wreaths, making a profit for the House of \$120. Every year since that time, Doreen has continued to take charge of the wreath orders, including pick-up and delivery.

Over the years the number of wreath orders has risen substantially. A couple of years ago, Doreen realized she would need a second vehicle to help transport all the wreaths. Now, Peter and Carol Koeslag help her out by filling their trailer with the greenery. This year alone, Doreen sold 131 wreaths.

In fifteen years Doreen has sold 1,231 wreaths, netting the museum a profit of \$7,375. As with many things, the cost of the wreaths has not remained constant. For several years, due to the supplier's increase in wholesale cost, Doreen even made up the difference in personal donations to the House.

On behalf of the Management Committee, the Peterborough Historical Society, the staff and volunteers of Hutchison House, it is my great pleasure to say a very special "thank you" to Doreen Jones and to recognize her constant dedication and commitment to the Museum. Doreen, you are a real Champ!

Anyone who has purchased a wreath from Doreen will know they are a beautiful addition to the décor of the season. When you hang a fresh evergreen wreath you are following a time-honoured tradition. The wreath is a sign of faith in humanity and in life and victory over life's challenges. And during the cold months of winter, wreaths add a feeling of warmth, building a sense of excitement for the holiday season.
