The Voices of Northcote Farm 1883-2010

Northcote Farm is a 210 acre property on Lake Katchawnooka, just south of Young's Point. It is now owned by Lakefield College School.

The presentation will include slides and readings from early days to the school's future plans to interpret the land, water, buildings and written legacy of those who lived or visited the farm over the years.

Stories begin with Susannah Moodie's description of the wild raspberry patches. Much earlier, a native portage trail hugged the shoreline from Clear Lake to the west end of the property. A navel officer emigrated from France in the 1840's and built a log cabin where he raised a large family. This cabin is still standing.



Dr. Campbell Mellis Douglas settled his young family on the property in 1883 in the big house that had been built in 1878. George Douglas returned to the farm in 1907 and lived there until 1961. Dr. Hugh Gastle of Lakefield bought the property in 1962, with the promise to retain its natural and historic character. His addition of horses and sleighrides became a much-loved attraction for over 45 years.

In October 2008, the property was officially accepted by Lakefield College School, thanks to a generous donation. The Northcote Campus comprises 160 acres, 5,000 feet of shoreline, two log cabins, two barns, a house and a collection of antique cutters, sleighs, boats and wagons.

Through letters and documents, the evening promises to provide unique insights into the lives of those who cherished Northcote Farm for well over a century and a half.

Along the way you will be entertained with readings from period accounts of the area. It promises to be an enjoyable and informative day with great scenery, a wonderful hot meal served on board the vessel and congenial companions to travel with. Tickets usually go fast so please sign up early to avoid disappointment. The trip represents one of our major fund raising activities and I encourage you to support the work of the Society and enjoy a great outing.

#### **2011 Heritage Award Winners**

The PHS Heritage Awards for 2011 were presented on Wednesday April 20<sup>th</sup> at the Empress Gardens. These awards are given annually to individuals and groups that have made significant contributions to heritage preservation in Peterborough and surrounding area. Graham Hart acted as Master of Ceremonies for the event.

Nominations are invited from the community at large. Winners are selected by a panel of volunteer judges: Graham Hart, Louis Taylor and Dr. Art Turner.

- The F.H. Dobbin Award: for exceptional coverage of historical events, through writing, photos or videos. The winner is Elwood Jones for his book *Little Lake Cemetery*.
- The Samuel Armour Award: for initiatives that involve and expose students to local historical opportunities and programs or development of curriculum, based on local history. Kerry –Lynn Parsons won for her Teachers' Guide in support of the theatre production about Sir Sandord Fleming, *A Man of His Time*, by Peterborough's Heritage Pavilion Stage.
- The J. Hampden Burnham Award: for establishing a venue for public awareness of historic events, places or people. The winner is the Save the St. Martin's Parish Hall Committee for its successful campaign to stop the possible demolition of this historic building.
- The George Cox Award: for historical restoration and/or preservation of Peterborough properties, including artifacts, structures, gardens and parks. Cowinners of this awards are: Terry and Katherine Helmer for restoration and adaptive re-use of the 1840s Westwood Mill on the Ouse River: and, Seven Hills Developments for the refurbishment of the facade of the Turnbull Building, respecting the heritage aspects and original dignity of this downtown Peterborough landmark.

There was no winner of the **Charlotte Nicholls Award** for significant financial donations to heritage preservation.
