

Previous consideration: Tree Conservation By-law;

2017: Report USDIR17-008; Introduction of a Tree By-law for the Conservation and Enhancement of the City's Tree Canopy; Committee of the Whole; September 25th.

2019: Report IPSIM 19-007; Tree Conservation By-Law; General Committee; March 4th

March 4: Feedback:

Council expressed concerns with the proposed & existing By-Laws;

- Too restrictive
- Desire for more reasonable implementation
- Permit process has been poorly received



Magnitude of Urban Forest canopy:

• 25% of trees are on private properties under 1 ha

approximately 4.95 sq km within the City

equivalent area of approximately 27 Jackson Parks.



Municipal Act, 2001 requires the City to establish policies that outline

"The manner in which the municipality will <u>protect</u> and <u>enhance</u> the tree canopy and natural vegetation in the municipality",

Proposed By Law Process:

- Balance: property owners' rights & legislative requirement
- Prescriptive rather than restrictive



Information to Maintain Urban Canopy Inventory

- owner's name and contact information,
- species; if known
- diameter/size: a picture can also be submitted
- condition of the tree(s): dead or dying or healthy
- purpose for removal of tree(s)
- intention to replace (yes/no)



Interim Strategy for Tree Conservation By-law: Next Steps

Communication:

- Via Website
- Current files
- Arborists

Incentive and Canopy Protection

- Tree Replacement program developed annually
- Incentive Program
- Partnership/Sponsorship of Tree re-placement

Consultation and Awareness Building

- o Public engagement program; Arborists, property owners, potential partners & key stakeholder
- Feedback and data collected; analyzed to ensure the new program achieves the balance sought

Report to Council

- o Full update on the success of the Interim By-Law, feedback received and recommendation(s) for future
- o Target: Fall 2019



Motion tabled at the General Committee on Monday March 4 2019:

- That the report be deferred to enable staff to consult with the public on the current by-law and,
- That the permitting provisions in By-law 17-120 be temporarily suspended and,
- That the permitting requirements for all current applications be included in the suspension and,
- That staff seek public input on a new tree conservation strategy



New Recommendation

- That By-law 17-120 be repealed;
- That the interim Tree Conservation By-law, attached to Report IPS19-007B as Appendix A, be adopted and
- That staff implement the proposal interim strategy as outlined in new By-law, including community consultation, and report back to Council in the fall of 2019.
