


Peterborough Museum & Archives gets a financial boost from Government of Canada





The Government of Canada is supporting the Peterborough Museum & Archives with a \$97,330 grant from the COVID-19 Emergency Support Fund for Cultural, Heritage and Sport Organizations.

The Government of Canada created the \$500-million Emergency Support Fund as an additional temporary support measure for cultural, heritage and sports organizations that are experiencing significant financial losses as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Of this amount, \$53 million is going to the heritage sector through the Museums Assistance Program. The emergency fund helps affected organizations maintain their operations.

The Museums Assistance Program supports heritage institutions in an effort to preserve and exhibit heritage collections. It encourages the preservation of Indigenous cultural heritage and access to heritage collections for all Canadians. It

also promotes the development of knowledge, skills and professional practices related to key museum functions.

"The Government of Canada knows our cultural and heritage organizations are one of the many sectors facing financial hardships due to COVID-19. These organizations play a valuable role in our community preserving and exhibiting our history. To ensure they can keep staff on the payroll and continue their important work, the federal government has invested more than \$200,000 here in Peterborough-Kawartha through our Museums Assistance Program to support the Peterborough Museum and Archives, the Canadian Canoe Museum, Hutchison House, and Trent Valley Archives through this difficult time." – Maryam Monsef, Member of Parliament for Peterborough-Kawartha

The Peterborough Museum & Archives is located in Ashburnham Memorial Park on Museum Drive, 300 Hunter St. E., in Peterborough. Hours are Monday to Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Saturdays, Sundays and holidays (including Remembrance Day), noon to 5 p.m. Admission is by donation, with free parking and barrier-free access.
