Accessibility Staff Report

Purpose

A report to advise the Accessibility Advisory Committee on the current work of Accessibility staff.

Recommendation

That the Accessibility Advisory Committee (AAC) approve the recommendation outlined in Report AAC21-010 dated April 7, 2021, of the Accessibility Compliance Coordinator as follows:

That Report AAC21-010 with respect to the current work of Accessibility staff be received for information.

Budget and Financial Implications

There are no budgetary or financial implications associated with the recommendation.

Background

AODA Compliance

The City received a compliance extension to December 31, 2021 for section 14 of the Integrated Accessibility Standards Regulation (IASR), accessible websites and web content. The areas of non-compliance are related to online documents and videos on City websites.

Section 14 of the IASR requires online City websites, web content and web-based applications to meet the international standard for website accessibility called Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 2.0 at Levels A and AA, including all PDF documents.

The City continues to work towards compliance through action items related to software updates and maintenance, training, addressing new and existing online PDFs, procurement processes and annual budgeting. Significant compliance work will continue throughout 2021.

Accessibility Reviews

The best way to remove barriers is to prevent them. Accessibility staff provide formal reviews for various development applications and during the planning and design stages of City projects, including projects related to buildings, public spaces, services, documents, websites, by-laws, plans and policies. Reviews and research completed in March 2021 include:

1. Official Plan and Zoning By-law Amendment applications

Accessibility staff support various City departments every week to remediate PDFs or provide content on the website, either as HTML pages or as online forms. The following list represents a sampling of projects, research and education activities:

- PDF/UA-1 (ongoing research on PDF standards as they relate to WCAG 2.0)

6. Procurement

Accessibility staff provide ongoing reviews of bid solicitation documents to ensure accessibility is incorporated into every major purchase the City makes. Every project requires the organization we do business with to complete accessibility training as it applies the scope of work. The following list represents a sampling of projects that incorporated accessibility beyond the training requirements:

Accessibility Training

Accessibility staff delivered two 2-hour workshops and two one-on-one training sessions in March 2021 on creating accessible PDFs. Staff knowledge of accessible documents and PDF remediation skills continues to grow monthly. There is currently 60 staff on a priority 1 training list.

Accessibility launched a new course called IAS-105-F Accessible PDF Compliance Check, through the City's <u>Accessibility Resources and Training web page</u>. The course will help City staff verify if a document submitted by a consultant is accessible. The course is available to anyone who wants to learn more about checking for PDF compliance.
