Holnbeck Award



Accessibility Advisory Committee



The City of Peterborough Accessibility Advisory Committee (AAC)

Commitment to Accessibility

- The City is committed to demonstrate leadership for accessibility in the community.
- Our goal is to meet the diverse needs of all people and follow the principles of dignity, independence, integration and equal opportunity.
- We will strive to achieve an inclusive environment for our facilities, goods, services, employment, information and transportation.

Ontarians with Disabilties Act, 2001 (ODA)

The ODA was established by the Province with the goal of improving the opportunities for people with disabilities. Municipalities are responsible to prepare annual accessibility plans, as well as consider accessibility in their planning processes, and when they buy goods and services. Each municipality with a population of over 10,000 people is to establish an Accessibility Advisory Committee (AAC) to advise Council on how to make the municipality more accessible to people with disabilities. The majority of the members of the committee are to be people with disabilities.

Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005 (AODA)

The AODA sets a progressive goal to create a more inclusive Ontario by January 1, 2025. There are two current standards under the AODA, which are now law: The Customer Service Standard introduced in 2005 and the Integrated Accessibility Standard in 2011.

Ontario's Human Rights Code (HRC)

The HRC is for every person. It is a provincial law that ensures equal rights and opportunities without discrimination in specific areas, such as jobs, housing and services. The HRC's goal is to prevent discrimination and harassment because of race, sex, age, and disability to name a few.

City of Peterborough Accessibility Plan

The City's accessibility plan outlines the steps the City will take to identify, remove and prevent barriers for people with disabilities. www.peterborough.ca/AccessibilityPlans

AAC

The AAC advises on the City's municipal service responsibilities such as site plan reviews, access plans, and Access Fund requests. They advise staff and City Council on accessibility issues related to City facilities and services, the implementation of accessibility standards and the preparation of accessibility reports. Members of the AAC are appointed by City Council following an application process. Members are listed on the City's website.
